As we approach a new year and look back on 2025, it has been another rewarding year for our department. We have seen significant changes and implemented several new programs with more changes to come in the near future.

To date, our calls for service are slightly ahead of last year. making 2025 one of the busiest years on record. While we had a high number of small brush fires this summer, we were able to extinguish them quickly before any could turn into a major wildfire. A big part of this was due to milder weather and new programs we have implemented. We now have two squads operating during peak times. While they can respond to a variety of calls, they are also brush fire apparatus designed for operating in and around areas where wildfires can spread. Additionally, we have increased our firefighters' training standards related to wildfires. With new training

and equipment, our firefighters are better prepared to mitigate wildfires than they have ever been.

Another big success this year was achieving a fire Protection Class 2 (PC2) rating from the Washington Surveying and Rating Bureau. Every five years, fire departments across the state are rated and assigned a fire protection class of 1 through 10, where PC1 indicates exemplary fire protection capabilities, and PC10 indicates the capabilities, if any, are insufficient.

Achieving a PC2 rating is not only a reflection of our department's services and capabilities, but also the high level of support our community provides in order for us to be successful in our mission. Currently, West Pierce Fire & Rescue is the only fire department in Pierce

County with a PC2 rating. In fact, less than 2.5% of all fire departments in the state are able to achieve a PC2.

Although we are very proud or our success, we definitely don't plan on sitting idle. Looking ahead to next year, we plan on making another big investment in community safety. In January, we will be placing a second ladder company in service. This is something we have been working to establish for some time. Starting next year, we will have one ladder company located at our Steilacoom Blvd. station in Lakewood, and one placed in our University Place station.

I am very proud of everything we have accomplished so far this year, and look forward to all of the great things we will be doing in 2026. On behalf of myself and every member of our department, we greatly appreciate the support we receive from the community and look forward to providing you with the best services possible.

Chief Sharp is the only WPFR employee to have served in both departments prior to the merger and is currently the district's longest-tenured employee!

A cardiac arrest requires a full team to give the patient the best chance of survival. Ideally, eight trained personnel respond: two perform CPR, three operate advanced medical equipment, one documents the care, and two direct treatment.

Just like fighting a fire, greater risks require more resources. Emergencies such as cardiac arrest, respiratory failure, serious trauma, or shock demand both the right equipment and enough trained hands to act quickly. According to the American Heart Association, cardiac arrest claims more lives than colorectal cancer, breast cancer, prostate cancer, influenza, pneumonia, auto accidents, HIV, firearms, and house fires combined. Every second counts, and sending multiple firefighters and paramedics ensures life-saving care can begin immediately.

October is Cardiac Arrest Awareness Month

Cardiac arrest can happen anywhere – and fast. Immediate CPR can double or even triple someone's chance of survival.

CUSTOM-FIT HELMETS & LIFE JACKETS

Fittings are scheduled by appointment and the wearer must be present in order to purchase. Please call or visit our website to schedule an appointment. Helmets are available for \$11-\$15 and life jackets for \$19.





PRESCHOOL & DAY CARE EDUCATION

Fire safety programs are available for preschools and day cares to use in the classroom at no cost.

Teachers conduct several lessons of the curriculum and WPFR personnel come in to teach the final lesson so small children learn firefighters are their friends.

CAR SEAT INSTALLATIONS & CHECKS

Did you know that more than 50% of children are improperly restrained in vehicles?

Residents within the fire district may schedule an appointment with a certified Child Passenger Safety Technician to have their car seat installed or checked for proper installation.

CONNECTED CARE PROGRAM

The Connected Community Access, Referral and Education (CARE) Program supports community members who need services outside the 9-1-1 system. Led by Program Manager Karen Gilbert, a Registered Nurse, CARE helps individuals navigate healthcare access, transportation, food, social services, chronic disease management, and behavioral health. Since its launch, CARE has surpassed a milestone of over 1,000 referrals, including 419 so far in 2025 – an average of approximately 46 referrals a month.

West Pierce CARES provides essential services that taxpayer dollars can't cover, including bike helmets, smoke alarms, assistance for fire victims, and nonemergency transportation to healthcare. CARES is a 501(c) (3) charity funded by employee and community donations and grants. From Grants to Gear

New resources making a real difference on the front lines!

Thanks to our largest-ever equipment grant (\$1.1 million) crews were able to start using brand-new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBAs) this summer. The upgraded gear is lighter, offers clearer communication, and comes with a longer-lasting battery life. Other recent grant funding includes \$717,000 for EMS defibrillators, \$100,000 from the Department of Energy, and \$900,000 from the Department of Emergency Management for new generators.

Youth Academy




West Pierce Fire & Rescue's Youth Academy is a great way for students ages 14-18 to experience what it's like to be a firefighter. This two-

day FREE academy offers students the opportunity to learn about various disciplines within the fire service, while gaining handson experience. The application period typically opens in May and the orientation, academy, and graduation take place in June.

THE SIMPLEST WAY TO SAVE A LIFE

Working smoke alarms are vital for alerting you to potential fires and providing critical seconds to escape. Your home should have alarms inside and outside every sleeping area and on every level. Smoke alarms should be less than 10 years old, whether hard-wired or battery-operated.

According to the NFPA, nearly three out of five home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or with alarms that fail to operate. Having alarms on every level of your home and near sleeping areas dramatically increases your chances of safely escaping a fire.

Thanks to a grant, WPFR offers free smoke and carbon monoxide alarm assessments and installations in Steilacoom, Lakewood, and University Place. Appointments typically take 15 to 45 minutes and are conducted by trained personnel who guide you through your home. Our team includes bilingual staff fluent in Spanish so more community members can benefit from this life-saving service.




